EMPOWERING FEMALE HEALTHCARE WORKERS IN LELE, NEPAL

With minimal training and little equipment these women in Lele, Nepal are the frontline healthcare and social workers for men, women and children living in nearby villages. They often travel on foot to bring medical care to people in need. Working with the local community and a nearby hospital, Dooley Intermed is planning a 2-week intensive training program for 20 female healthcare workers. The local community is very supportive



and enthusiastic. The cost will be \$300 per student, including equipping them with a proper medical kit upon their "graduation" from the training course. With 20 trainees the total cost will be \$6,000.

SANTA INES CLINIC, NICARAGUA

Dooley Intermed continues to support the remote Santa Ines Clinic, on the Coco River in Nicaragua. The new Maternal Care Center is open and extremely busy. Patients are treated regardless of ability to pay, and outreach clinics are held in remote villages reachable only by four-wheel-drive vehicles along jungle trails, and by outboard powered boats and dugout canoes. In line with our long-term policy of promoting selfsufficiency and community development, all the Clinic staff is native Nicaraguan, and most belong to the Miskito Indian ethnicity, originating from the villages served by this program.

OUTREACH EYE CAMP

Dooley Intermed continued its "Gift of Sight" program bringing needed eye care to villagers in Nepal near the epicenter of the devastating Nepal earthquake. In December of 2017 we initiated a large-scale outreach eye camp in Machhakhola Village in the Upper Gorkha Region in a cooperative project with Operation Restore Vision. The area is quite remote and has no roads, so our team had to travel by four-wheel-drive vehicles, and then on foot. Medical supplies and equipment were transported by mule caravan due to the remote location. Over 800 villagers, including a large number of school children received free-of-cost eye examinations and

treatment and 71 sight-restoring surgeries were performed. We have another "Gift of Sight" program in the planning stage, for an extremely remote area of Western Nepal. Getting there will take 4 days of travel, from Kathmandu. Restoring vision by providing eyeglasses and cataract surgeries are among the most cost-effective profoundly life-changing medical interventions that exist.
